Woodlands School



At the start of the 2nd term, we introduced the John Muir award to our regular Year 8 classes and Phoenix Centre students. Each group has started to undertake 25 hours of work towards the award. We begin to explore themes such as conservation in the woodlands by litter picking, path clearing and removing non-native plants such as bamboo from the woodlands.

Four Challenges are at the heart of the John Muir Award – **Discover a Wild Place – Explore it – Conserve It – Share Your Experience.** They are designed to promote a holistic approach to learning – including awareness, understanding and action – and reflect John Muir’s wilderness experience. We have started to film our activities and aim to have a short video documenting the John Muir award and other activities in the woods.

Monk Woods is perfect for the awards because they are next to the school and most of the learners haven’t learnt about trees, plants, habitat and the environment before. We introduced a hammock this term to the camp which proved to be very popular with all the groups. The other popular activities for the groups were fire making, hide and seek, chopping wood, den building, setting up tents, cooking and whittling.

Chopping wood has given students the opportunity to get in touch with their inner lumberjack. It is a great stress reliever, and outlet for frustration. Many of the students found it very satisfying and empowering. During any activity that requires exertion, chopping wood included, your body produces and releases endorphins and adrenaline - both feel-good chemicals!

Next term we’ll continue with the John Muir award and our other activities and aim to finish the short video to share with the school.


Humanities




Staff CPD training






